How Can I Help My Child At Home?

Spelling

- try to make spelling activities enjoyable
- · say rhymes and tongue twisters together
- play 'detective' games with words; be detectives and find:

o words that rhyme, e.g. can, fan, man, tan

- words that begin with the same sound, eg sun, sausage, sea and clap, climb, cliff
- words that end with the same sound, e.g. hat, eat, bit and happy, grumpy, chilly
- o little words in big words, e.g. carpet: car, pet, are, care, tar
- words that sound the same but are spelt differently, e.g. ate eight, to two too, their there
- play word games such as Junior Scrabble, Boggle, Word Snap,
 Wonderwords, Junior Crosswords, I Spy, Scattegories, Junior Pictionary
- challenge your child to write words with three letters, five letters and so on, e.g. body parts 3-arm lip 4-lung hand 5-heart liver etc
- encourage your child to 'have a go' at spelling words and give them appropriate clues if they have trouble
- encourage your child to 'sound out' words, e.g. h-i-t, s-a-n-d
- ask your child to write words that are not easily 'sounded out', e.g. watch, after, through
- \circ encourage your child to develop memory tricks for spelling words, e.g. 'a piece of pie', 'hear with your ear'
- show interest in your child's personal spelling lists
- show your child how to use dictionaries, encyclopedias and thesauruses

LEARNING WORDS

Use the following steps to help you to learn words:

- LOOK at the word, so that you have a picture of it in your head.
 Be able to visualise it if you close your eyes.
- 2) SAY the word.
- 3) NAME the letters of the word.
- COVER the word.
- 5) WRITE the word.
- 6) CHECK the word, letter by letter to see if it is correct.
